# **About Great Music in a Great Space**

## **About Kent Tritle**

Kent Tritle is one of America's leading choral conductors. Called "the brightest star in New York's choral music world" by the New York *Times*, Tritle is in his seventh season as Director of Cathedral Music and organist at New York's Cathedral Church of Saint John the Divine. He is also Music Director of the Oratorio Society of New York and of Musica Sacra. He is Director of Choral Activities and Chair of the Organ Department at the Manhattan School of Music and on the graduate faculty of the Juilliard School. He is organist of the New York Philharmonic and the American Symphony Orchestra.

Tritle holds graduate and undergraduate degrees from the Juilliard School in organ performance and choral conducting. He has been featured on ABC's *World News Tonight* and on National Public Radio and Minnesota Public Radio, as well as in the New York *Times* and the *Wall Street Journal*.

# **About Bryan Zaros**

Bryan Zaros is a young American conductor recognized for his "strong musical imagination" and "deep sense of musicality and communication." A native New Yorker, Zaros began his professional musical training as a member of the Metropolitan Opera Children's Chorus and as a boy chorister at The Church of the Transfiguration, NYC. He is the Music Director of the Pro Arte Chorale, an ensemble with a 55-year legacy specializing in the performance of choral/orchestral masterworks. He received a Bachelor of Music in Sacred Music from Westminster Choir College and a Master of Music in Conducting from the University of Michigan. He is currently a candidate for the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Conducting at the Manhattan School of Music. Zaros began his tenure as the Associate Choirmaster at the Cathedral of Saint John the Divine in August 2016 and made his conducting debut with the Cathedral's Choirs at Westminster Abbey, London. Raymond Nagem completed his D.M.A. at The Juilliard School in May 2016, where he was a student of Paul Jacobs. Dr. Nagem is a native of Medford, MA, where he attended the Boston Archdiocesan Choir School and began to study the organ with John Dunn. He earned his B. A. from Yale University in 2009, where he was a double major in Music and Psychology, and studied the organ with Thomas Murray, and his M.A. in 2011 from Juilliard.

He has worked since 2010 at St. John the Divine, where he has primary responsibility for service playing and choral accompaniment and works regularly with the cathedral's several choral ensembles. In addition to these duties, he performs frequently in recital both in New York and across the country. His debut CD, *Divine Splendor*, recorded at St. John the Divine, was released on the Pro Organo label in 2014.

# **About Gregory Purnhagen**

Gregory Purnhagen enjoys an eclectic career encompassing diverse eras and genres. His numerous projects for Philip Glass include *La Belle et la Bête, Monsters of Grace, Galileo Galilei, Einstein on the Beach, Songs of Milarepa*; Glass's song repertoire at Weil Hall, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, The City Winery and Town Hall and, most recently, a new role written for him in *Drowning*. Gregory has created cabaret shows in New York, most notably the Backstage Bistro Award-winning *Babalu-cy! The Art of Desi Arnaz*. With the 13-piece New Xavier Cugat Orchestra, he has performed in Florida; at the PNC Arena and at the Montreal International Jazz Festival.
