## CELEBRATE THE SEASON: VIRTUAL CHRISTMAS EVE AND CHRISTMAS DAY SERVICES AT THE CATHEDRAL OF ST. JOHN THE DIVINE

The service will be livestreamed at 4 pm and will be available to view later in the evening across the Cathedral's social media platforms.

<u>PM</u>. Following the format of the Cathedral's usual Sunday and Feast Day services during the time of COVID, the Cathedral celebrates a Service of the Word virtually for Christmas Day. The Dean of the Cathedral presides, and the Bishop of New York preaches.
